March 25th was the great Mothers' Union day of the year. We had nearly all the members present at the Holy Communion at 9.30. The election of Churchwardens took place on the Thursday in Easter week, when Mr. Evenden and Mr. Duncan were re-appointed to the office. We are grateful for all their work, which is heavy sometimes.

It is with sorrow that we record the death of Captain Beauclerk. He was present at the Service at Smarden Parish Church on Easter morning, but was taken ill immediately afterwards and passed to his rest the same morning. No one could wish for a happier hour in which to die, on the day when Christ brought life and immortality to light, and just after joining in worship. Captain Beauclerk, during his long residence here, had endeared himself to Pluckley people by his friendliness and his interest in village affairs, and especially in the doings of our ex-Service men.

Ascension Day falls on May 14th. We invite you to join us in the Church Services that day, as far as is possible on a working day. It is one of the great Festivals of the Church, and we like to keep it holy, as we should do.

The three days before Ascension Day are the Rogation days, with special services of prayer.
