



On Whit-Sunday we look forward to welcoming a large number of Communicants once more.




We were all distressed by the sudden death of Mr. Bourne. He was a shepherd who loved his sheep, and who died amongst them.

The Mothers' Union had their Monthly Meeting on Wednesday, June 20th, when Miss Evans, from Smarden, gave them an address, which was much appreciated.







The Choir sang Hopkins' <sup>44</sup> Te Deum" in the morning, and Martin's settings to the Canticles in the evening: the anthem being "Ye shall dwell in the land." All the music was well rendered.

The Harvest Services at St. Mary's were on October 11th-old Michaelmas Day, which is the end of the agricultural year. The Preacher was the Rev. C. If. Coe, and the seats were all filled. As at the Parish Church, the gifts of fruit and vegetables were more than usual. 
