Of this bulance £500 stands to our Credit in the Post Office Savings Bank; £243.16,4 at Lloyds Bank; and £1.4,2 in hand. It is estimated that about £400 will be absorbed by the rather heavy responsibility of repairing the bells, whenever this work can be undertaken.

Lambeth Conference In last months Diocesan Notes the Archbishop drew our attenflion to the Lambeth Conference, when, after an interval of eighteen years, some 500 Bishops of the Anglican Communion will meet for Conference In July next. In this connection a Lambeth week-end has been arranged when a team of Bishops, possibly four in number, will pay a visit to our Diocese. This will be from Friday May 28th to Monday May 31st. You may like to know that the following services hove been arranged for the Saturday in Canterbury Cathedral. Youth Service at 5,p.m. Evening Service 5,50 p.m. and at Maidstone Parish Church at 5.p.m. on Sunday. Bishops from Overseas will address those services.

Laymens Fund for Clergy Stipends A Fund has been initiated by the Lay Members of the Diocesan Conference to assist in bringing the stipends of incumbents up to a minimum of £500 per annum. Lambeth Conference, This is much in our minds just now. What is the Lambeth Conference? Briefly it is a family-gathering of the Bishops of our Anglican Church called to Lambeth Palace by the Archbishop of Canterbury so that the whole Church may reach a common mind on the problems which confront it. It is not a parliament and it makes no laws but what the Bishops decide has a greet influence in every corner of the Communion. It first met in 1867 end has met normally every ten years since, How much the Anglican Communion has grown will be seen by the number of Bishops who attended the first in. 1867 which was 76 compareod with 307 on the last occasion in 1930. The Anglican Church has today over 300 dioceses; it contains great National and regional Churches – Canada, the U.S.A., South Africa, Japan, China; and so on, Tho same services are said and sung in many tongues, communicants are of every colour and race, there are hundreds of clergy of nationality as wide apart as the Esquimo and the Maori (to aay nothing of the variety of its Bishops). And so they come, Bishops of the worldwido Anglican Church to Lambeth in this year of 1948. They come to pray and to discuss the many problems of our time. They come to bring greetings and to tell of great epportunitios for new advance, of dire need and poverty, and of strong opposition – but also of great courage and faith in the hearts of our follow Anglicans Overseas,



You have kindly given to me the opportunity of recording my impressions of Pluckley - and what shall I say? "For peaceful homes and healthful days" Again and again th last fortnight I have found myself humming

these lines because they seem to express so perfectly the atmosphere of this truly English village; this village with its Beeches, Elms and Oaks, with its uniformly shaped windows, and, most important

of all with its friendly and charming poople. I like to picture Pluckley (I wish I knew the derivation of its uncommon name) Churchas the Mother of the Weald, and Egerton's Tower as the Weald's Father. Both stand on superb sites with their family at their foot: ancient, benign and abiding - these Churches are surely the guardians of the Weald. It seems quite fitting that they should have suffered when their land

was ravaged by enemy aircraft; for them to have remained

untouched at such a time would have separated them from their suffering, hurrassed children, but now Pluckey scars are another link with the life and death of her family. What a pity there isn 't another Dering to write another Chapter of History in the St Nicholas Chapel: does their ghost come I wonder and wander. amid the old old yews of the Churchyard; and does he ride a ghostly invicta?

Back to earth and to 1948. There is a great work to be done, the Church must be fully restored, the Bells must call again, the Weald must know that Pluckley St Nicholas is standing firm against all evil and her children - be they 8 or 80 years old matters not - must come into her courts with gladness, for dad is calling and shall this generation be deaf.

And so goodbye and many grateful thanks for kindly nod and friendly word: when I get back to Town streets I shall still bear in mind the buss of ''innumerable bees in emmemmreable elms' which word3 belong so truly to friendly Pluckloy - and I'm stil] humming "For peacefull homes
