SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 3rd is the fifth anniversary of the SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 3rd is the fifth anniversary of the outbreak of the war, arid is ordered by His Majesty the King to "be observed as a day of National Prayer. Falling as it does on a Sunday this year, we hope that it may be well observed by large numbers of our people in Pluckley.. The war is going on so well on all fronts for the Allies that we may well venture to hope that this anniversary may be the last we shall keep of actual fighting, at any rate so far as the war against Germany is concerned.

THE HARVEST FESTIVAL will be held on Sunday, October 1st, when all the services, with the exception of Holy Communion at 8 a.m., will be held at St.Mary's Church. As usual, the collections will be for the Ashford hospital and the Royal Agricultural Benevolent Institution.

PARISH CHURCH, The Architect, Mr.Anderson, reports as follows on the Parish Church:-

In addition to dealing with the windows, I propose to "repair the tiled roofs, refix the Nave roof timbers in proper "position, renew the eaves gutters, reinstate the ceilings to "the Chancel, Dering Chapel and Vestry, repair the doors, rebuild "the chimney stack from the Vestry, and reset the displaced and "fallen stonework to the exterior of the Vestry, I have asked "Mr.Shippam to let me have an approximate estimate for these "works and so soon as I receive the estimate. I will apply to "works, and so soon as I receive the estimate, I will apply to "the Ministry of Works for the necessary licence, which must be "obtained before the works are commenced,"

The Organ from the parish Church has "been taken to the Works of Messrs. F.H,Browne & Sons, Organ Builders, Canterbury, for thorough examination and repair. It will "be a long time before it is repaired and replaced. The estimate for "A", the repair of War Damage, is £98; and for "B", the repair of thirty years' wear ia .£22.10s "A" will be met by the War Damage Commission. "B" will be the responsibility of the Parish.

MOTHERS' UNION. It is hoped to resume our meetings in September, and to have a visit from Mrs.Gilham, the presiding Member for the Deanery Details as to time and date will be given later, There are several ways in which the M.U. can help with the upkeep of some of the Church furnishings while repair work is being carried on and we must plan how best we oan take our part in the beautifying and restoration of our beloved Church.

NURSING ASSOCIATION. A Flag Day in aid of our District Nursing Association will be held in Pluckley on Saturday, September 9th. Everyone knows the value of the work done by our Nurses, and this is the one appeal we make during the year for help towards our finances. May we ask for generous support for our own local fund.

CHURCH RESTORATION AND IMPROVEMENT PUND, As was announced in last month's Parish Notes, the Parochial Church Council have decided to make an appeal for £1,000. in order to restore and "beautify the Church which we all love so well, and which suffered such heavy destruction az a result of a flying bomb in July last. It is, of course, true that the War Damage Commission will undertake responsibility for all structural repair, but, at the same time, we are now, as the Archdeacon of Maidstone, after a recent visit to the Church, said, presented with a marvellous opportunity for improving and beautifying our Church.

What we shall be able to accomplish depends entirely upon the response that will "be made to the appeal, hut there are certain improvements which the Parochial Church Council think are essential, namely, the installation of a new heating system in place of the present archaic and rather costly one. Then it is hoped that a new organ may be possible, or failing this, it will be necessary to greatly improve the present one, as this will involve a cost in addition to the amount of insurance payable. There still remain many other possibilities of improvement and beautification, which, if the money is forthcoming, may be undertaken.

We appeal, therefore, with absolute confidence to all our parishioners, knowing that you will respond to this appeal with the greatest possible generosity. It is most gratifying to be able to state that already the members of the Pluckley Branch of the Mothers' Union have undertaken to raise f100. towards this Fund. We may all regard, any contribution we may make to this Fund as a personal thanksgiving for God's blessings during the War, and for Peace, which we which we believe will not be very long delayed. The Rector is the Treasurer of this fund, and will be glad to receive your contributions. The HARVEST FESTIVAL services held at St.Mary's Church on Sunday, October 1st were fairly well attended. Excellent taste was displayed in the decoration of the Church, and the result was most pleasing. Weare most grateful to the few, the very few, who under-took this work. We also extend our warmest thanks to all those who so kindly sent gifts of flowers, fruit and vegetables. These were afterwards sent to The Ashford Hospital and were greatly appreciated. The collections amounted to f1. 7. 0. for the Ashford Hospital and the

Royal Agricultural Benevolent Institution.

In the afternoon a Fruit and Flower Service, arranged by the members of the G.F,S.was held-in their Hut. The Lesson was read very nicely and reverently by Rosemary Heasman, There was quite a good congregation. We extend our thanks to Miss Evenden and the G F.S members for arranging the Service, They have also promised their kind help in conducting a Service for parents and Children to be held at the Hut on the second Sunday in future months at 3 p.m. . and we would earnestly ask our parents and children to make a special effort to support us by their attendance at these Services.
